Historically Speaking

I recently talked to Marion Short, Bill Horton and Johnny Johnson about the origin of the Livingston Gem and Mineral Society. The stories I heard were very similar but not identical. I figured if I put together a history based on all the points of agreement, well then, that should be a story very close to what really happened. Something like this:

In 1970 Johnny Johnson moved from his home town of Caspian, in the western U.P., down to Fowlerville, Michigan. Johnny was a self-taught electrician then and became employed at the Glover Electric Co. in Fowlerville. It was there and then that he met Nelson Short who was also employed with Glover. Both Johnny and Nelson were avidly interested in collecting rocks and minerals. Nelson was already a member of the Lansing Club and persuaded Johnny to join as well. Johnny and Nelson would drive to the meetings that took place once a month in Lansing. The Lansing Club did not have a lapidary shop, so the members would just come there to discuss their common interest in the lapidary arts.

It was a long way to Lansing so Johnny and Nelson would take turns driving there. On one of these trips they decided that all this driving was becoming tiresome and that they should just start a rock club of their own.

Thus was born the Livingston Gem and Mineral Society, the club we all enjoy so much today. They invited all their friends from Fowlerville, Howell and Hartland to join them and soon they had a large collection of permanent members.

The first meetings were held in a small room in the basement of the Howell Airport and the McDonald Funeral home supplied all the chairs for the meetings. Since there was no shop there, the first meetings were simply discussions about mineralogy, the lapidary arts, field trips and the fun of their shared interest. The Club would meet in Howell and at many other locations

until 1964, when the club moved to Hartland where two classrooms were obtained and a Lapidary Shop was installed in the "21 Building". Monthly meetings were held in the basement of the Krouse Building close by.

In 2005 the Club moved to the fine facilities that we now enjoy in the old Hartland High School, currently known as the Hartland Education Support Service Center.

Crystal Clear Cave

Not all caves are dark and creepy. A cave in Spain sparkles like diamonds. Geologists, or scientists who study the earth's rock and soil, discovered the cave in an old silver mine. The cave is actually a giant geode (jee-ohd), or a hollow rock lined with crystals. The sparkling space is the largest geode ever found. Most geodes are about the size of your fist. This geode is large enough for ten adults to fit inside it! The cave's crystals are made of a glassy material, called gypsum (jip-sam). The crystals are so clear, you can read a newspaper through them. Some crystals in this geode measure seven feet. That's taller than either of the two Spanish scientists who found it.

Basalts and Basalt Cavities

Basalts are the most common of all volcanic rocks. They are dark, fine-grained, and composed primarily of plagioclase feldspar, the pyroxenes augite and bronzite, and small amounts of iron and titanium oxides such as magnetite and limenite. The entire sea floor is composed of basaltic rock, extruded at the mid ocean ridges and transported outward as the sea-floor spreads, due to the forces of plate tectonics. Some magmas of basaltic composition do nto erupt on the earth's surface as basalts, but rather cool more slowly beneath the surface to form the coarser-grained rock types, diabase and gabbro. These rocks are coarser-grained because they cooled slowly, allowing the individual crystals time to grow larger. Gas bubbles that were unable to escape before the basaltic lava hardened into rock are often preserved as cavities in which a variety of crystals may form from the iron-enriched waters moving gradually through the rock. Not all basalt cavities host interesting mineral associations. Some remain completely empty, while others are filled only with crystalline and cryptocrystalline quartz.
