Historically speaking...

Bill Horton LGMS President 1986

For almost fifty years now, Bill Horton has been involved with or has been in some way connected with the progress and continued success of the Livingston Gem and Mineral Society. Starting in the early 60's and right up to 2012, he has been there for us in so many ways that it is hard to accurately enumerate all of his past activities, and it is hard to pass up an opportunity to try. He has been our advocate in all things lapidary, gem and mineral. He has been a tireless contributor, an innovator, a teacher and a risk taker, always ready to try something new. The following paragraphs are an attempt to sum up his many activities.

Bill Horton was born on June 5th, 1930 in Clare, Michigan. In 1935, Bill's family moved to Flint, Michigan where he attended Bently grade school. In 1937, Bills father was electrocuted while working on an assembly line. His mother never remarried so she had to raise Bill and his brothers and sisters all by herself. Bill went on to graduate from Davison High School in 1948.

In 1949, Bill went to work for General Motors in Milford and then joined the Navy in 1951. He served as an "AT" (Aviation Technician) in the Navy, and became an instructor stationed at Key West, Florida. Bill worked on Sonar systems to detect submarines and was the first to install this equipment in helicopters. In 1955 Bill got out of the Navy and went back to working at the GM proving grounds. He worked there for 37 years and retired in 1986.

Bill and his wife Shirley joined the LGMS in the early 60's and acquired two rooms in the old Hartland High School for the new home for the LGMS which had been meeting in Lansing and in Howell. It was Bill and his friends who painted the rooms, plumbed the shop, electrified the shop, set up all the benches and machinery and then painted all the machinery green, some of which is still in use today.

Bill had already begun his long and interesting friendship with Max Schultz who was a gem and mineral dealer in Cohoctah, Michigan. Max was diagnosed with lung cancer in the early 80's and died in 1987. Before he died he told Bill to gather all the minerals in his shop and sell them at auction. Max wanted the money generated by the auction to be donated to the LGMS in order to pay for the proper outfitting of our shop. It was then that Bill, along with the help of Hazel Morgan and Earl Netwal, sold off all of the minerals for \$6500.00 and fulfilled Max's final request.

Bill began his faceting career in 1975. He joined the Flint Faceting Club and also began his long friendship with Bill Gardener, a lapidary equipment dealer in Williamsburg, Michigan. In order to get off to a good start in faceting, Bill bought a brand new Prismatic faceting machine which he still uses to this day. For the next ten years Bill perfected his skills. He soon began teaching faceting and supplying hundreds of crystal diagrams to his students. In 1979 Bill became a charter member of the Midwest Faceting Guild and was its president for three years. Bill and his associates travelled all over the U.S. and as far as Australia. Bill and his friends had the use of a small van and as they travelled, they sang. Bill played the Auto-harp; someone else played a guitar and together they sang away the many miles of their outings.

Bill's wife Shirley was president of the LGMS in 1984 and 1985. Bill followed her as president in 1986 and then served as Shop Chairman for many years. Over the years, Bill received many awards as is shown in the following compilation:



From the club take M 59 west through Howell to Grand River, turn west on Grand River and go through Fowlerville to Webberville's red light. Turn north on Main and go 3 blocks to Pine. Pine only goes left (west). Go 3 blocks on Pine to the "Road Ends" sign. Go past the sign and that is Marv's driveway. Park on either the north or south side in the grass.

From I 96, go west to the Webberville exit # 122. Turn north on M52 to Grand River (about 1 mile) where there is a stop sign and flashing light. Turn right on Grand River to the Webberville red light. Turn north on Main and go 3 blocks to Pine. Pine only goes left (west). Go 3 blocks on Pine to the "Road Ends" sign. Go past the sign and that is Marv's driveway. Park on either the north or south side in the grass.
