President's Message



It was decided that the club should purchase it (estimated cost between \$300.00 and \$350.00). Gayland made the motion and Margaret seconded.

Chuck and Ed discussed the tickets and the new wording on them. Name of the show is changed to Rockhounds' Dream Show, and the address was clarified

Paul gave his update on advertising. The Community Life, Tri'County Times will have our ads. Our video will run on the website G1 NBC for two months. There will be a spot on Facebook. It may be necessary to order more flyers. All members should be encouraged to take them and distribute them. Directions: From the club, take M-59 east to US-23. Go north on US-23 for 12 miles to exit 79, Silver Lake Road. Turn left on W. Silver Lake Road. Go 3 miles entering Linden and continue on west through Linden for 2.7 miles. (Silver Lake Rd is labeled Broad St. in Linden – Watch your speed!) Turn left onto Knob Hill Drive as you come up a hill with road curving right. First Merit Bank is on the corner. Go ½ mile and 16143 ½ is on the left. Gayland will be guiding parking of cars. If you are coming from Howell, take M-59 to Argentine Rd, turn left on Argentine Rd and go 12 miles north to the blinking light in Argentine. Turn right on Silver Lake Rd and go 1 mile to Knob Hill Dr on the right at the First Merit Bank. Turn right on Knob Hill Dr and go ½ mile to 16143 ½ on the left. If using GPS leave off the "1/2" on the street number.



Hairy Gems

We think of rocks as hard, strong and boring. Then, all of a sudden, we are faced with something unearthly, almost unnatural. How could anything like this exist in the harsh, natural world? Unfortunately, many of these crystal oddities are extremely delicate. They are seldom displayed because of the great possibility of destroying their fragile beauty. So, I have taken the idea of introducing you to some wonderful hairy gems.

Natrolite is a common and popular zeolite mineral. Its radiating sprays of ice clear acicular crystals are a hall mark of this mineral and make a fine specimen.

Cyanotrichite is a wonderfully colored mineral. Its bright azure to sky-blue color is very impressive. Cyanotrichite typically forms acicular or hairlike crystals aggregated into radial clusters, tufts and sprays. The color is very impressive for such tiny crystals. It is an aptly named mineral since cyano and trich are derived from the Greek for blue and hair, respectively. It is formed from the oxidation of copper ore minerals along with other oxidation zone minerals.

Millerite is one of a few sulfide minerals that form fine acicular crystals that appear as hairlike fibers aggregated into sprays. It is a real bonus to quartz geode collectors from Indiana to Kansas to open up a geode and find a spray of brassy millerite crystals tucked inside. Millerite is also called "Capillary pyrite" since it has a brassy yellow color that is close to the color of pyrite. When found as brassy sprays inside of sparkling clear quartz geodes, millerite can make a wonderfully attractive and interesting mineral.

Tremolite is a relatively common mineral in some metamorphic rocks. One variety is composed of microscopically fibrous crystals called asbestos. Other minerals also form asbestos such as serpentine. Another variety of tremolite is called "mountain leather" or "mountain cork" and is an oddity in the mineral world. The tremolite fibers form a felted mass that has all the appearances and feel of a piece of cloth.

Rutile is an interesting, varied and important mineral. Rutile is a major ore of titanium, a metal used for high tech alloys because of its light weight, high strength and resistance to corrosion. Rutile is also unwittingly of major importance to the gemstone markets. It forms its own interesting and beautiful mineral specimens. Microscopic inclusions of rutile in quartz, tourmaline, ruby, sapphire and other gemstones, produces light effects such as cat's eye and asterisms (stars). A beautiful stone produced by large inclusions of golden rutile needles in clear quartz is called rutilated quartz.

Fragile, ethereal crystals; nature always surprises us with something new and delightful. Keep your eyes open, you never know what nature will show you next.
