Board Meeting Minutes 2-21-17

Attending were Bryant, Ed, Sherlynn, Isla, AnnMarie, Sheila, Jim, Venus. Sherlynn called the meeting to order at 1:35.

The January minutes were approved on motion from Sheila and second from Venus. Sheila's treasurer's report was shared and discussed. An excel spreadsheet is in development that will give us monthly income and expenditure reports. By the end of the year we will have captured all our financial activity in one document, providing a basis for future budgeting.

Venus presented several options to memorialize members who have died. On a motion from Ed and a second from Ann, it was agreed that Venus would be authorized to spend up to \$70.00 for such a purpose using knowledge of the family situation to guide the purchase.

Ed gave the shop report stating that everything is going well. He will be doing research to make the decision about purchasing a new chop saw. He is also shopping to find a storage facility which will accommodate our rock collection, be affordable and be accessible to the club.

Isla reported that 102 of our 171 families have paid dues for 2017. Some additional members who are active will need personal reminders. A few have likely chosen not to renew due to the increase in dues. Bryant reminded everyone that this is typical of the club's membership flow; new memberships being Bryant described the condition of the library. It was agreed that we should have a club copy of the faceting instruction book. The club already has several DVD's and this will be a good way to increase library information in the future. Ed made a motion to allot \$500.00 annually as a budget for the library. Jim seconded and it was passed.

AnnMarie reported that Marc Lampcov has agreed to be our webmaster. He will begin work on redesigning our website (free gratis) as soon as we can provide the User Name and Password to our site.

Bryant will be organizing a silent auction in March. Rocks will be displayed in the shop, with final bids being taken at the March General Membership meeting.

In March, the board will meet at 5 p.m. prior to the general meeting at 6 p.m. on the third Tuesday of the month (March 21).

At 2:46 Ed made motion to adjourn. This was seconded by AnnMarie and passed.

Perhaps the first "electrical " experiment conducted by man was performed by the Greek Philosopher Thales (640-546 B.C.). Thales observed that when a piece of a natural resin called amber was rubbed with a cloth, the amber attracted light objects near it. Today we say that rubbing amber with cloth gives the amber a charge of static electricity. The term "electricity" comes from "electra," the Greek word for amber.

Fulgurites

When lightning strikes sand, magic is formed

All it takes is a flash. Lightning strikes the ground, creating temperatures of more than 3,000 degrees. The sand around the lightning strike fuses together, and fulgurite is formed.

What are fulgurites? The word – based on the Latin word for thunderbolt – refers to a hollow glass tube formed when lightning strikes soil, silica, sand or even rock. These amazing structures – sometimes referred to as "petrified lightning" or "lightning stones" - don't look like the transparent glass in your windows or kitchen cabinets. Instead they are complex structures that resemble a cross between a vegetable root and some of the more crystalline minerals such as mica. They vary in shape and size – most are only a few inches long – and they tend to form around the path of the dispersing electric charge of the lightning.

According to the Utah Geological Survey, there are two types of fulgurites: those formed when lighting hits sand and those created from rock. Sand fulgurites come from beaches and deserts, have a more glass-like interior, and can be particularly fragile. Rock fulgurites, which are rarer, form as veins inside rocks and often need to be chiseled out of their surroundings.

Fulgurites have been found all over the world, although they are relatively rare. Their unusual structure, delicate nature and origin give them some value, although not in the range of precious metals. Some sites list small fulgurites for as little as \$15. The more attractive pieces or those processed into jewelry can fetch a few hundred dollars.

Although most collectors seek out fulgurite solely for its looks, some people believe the lightning stones hold magical abilities to help focus divine energy, enhance creativity, or heal various illnesses. The TV show "Supernatural" used fulgurites in a few episodes to summon gods or demons, although those uses don't appear to be part of any traditional lore.

Perhaps not surprisingly, some people enjoy making their own fulgurites, either by sticking lightning rods in sand before thunderstorms or using a high-voltage power supply in a lab. The resulting fulgurites can be even more attractive than those created naturally, although obviously safety is paramount when engaging in these activities.
