Selling Diamonds to Millennials is Tricky

DeBeers, the 129-year-old company that helped make diamond engagement rings a global standard, is working on a new proposition for customers. The London-based company is navigating a generational shift as millennials succeed baby boomers as the largest cohort of consumers. New tastes and social customs, including less emphasis on careers, money and marriage than in previous generations, pose a particular challenge for makers of expensive jewelry an other luxury goods. The company reported \$6.1 billion in revenue last year, up from \$4.7 billion a year earlier. But in 2014 DeBeers reported revenue of \$7.3 billion.
