LGMS General Membership Meeting for November 20, 2018

1. Call to order: Meeting was called to order by President Sherlynn Everly at 6:00 p.m. with 29 members present.

2. Financial report: Sheila York, treasurer, reported that the club is in good financial status. She will have the total profits of our show next month because the rent of the gym is still outstanding, with Hartland adjusting the amount of rent due to lack of janitor help.

3. Shop Report: Bill Magee reported that we are in the process of replacing the bottom tray and base of the grinders and polishers so they aren't wood. It will cost about \$150-\$200 for each double setup. Gayland Allen will work on the plumbing and drainage system. We need to wipe out the trays when we finish grinding and put drainage in the white pitchers so drainage doesn't plug up the system. We are in need of a new shot tumbler which will cost about \$200. It was voted on and passed to purchase a new shot tumbler. A big thank-you was given to Jim Hansen and Bill Magee for all the new initiatives they have implemented as shop chairmen.

4. Membership Report: Isla Mitchell reported we have 248 members. There is a box in the shop called the shop folder where members can have their newsletters placed instead of having them mailed. It saves on postage, so members need to ask Isla to make them a folder, and remember to pick up your newsletter every month.

5. Storage Unit Clean out Squad: Sherlynn stated our storage unit is still very full, even after our show. Members volunteered to help clean out unit on Tuesday, Nov. 27 at 1:30. Members will meet at the shop and carpool. We have many buckets of Petosky stones. Some will be brought back to the shop for members to take if wanted.

6. December Christmas Party: We will have a silent auction with items from our storage unit. There will be a \$10 stone-related Christmas wrapped gift exchange. We will have several stone competitions with a \$5 entry fee. Categories will be: Best polished cabochon (front and back), Best picture in a polished stone, Best stone jewelry item.

7. Election of 2019 Officers: The following slate of officers were voted on as a group with unanimous passage. Cinda Dawson, President; Ann Marie McFadden, Vice President; Lori Irvin, Secretary; Sheila York, Treasurer; Jim Parker 1st Year Director;

Dan Goodwin 1st year Director; Bill Magee 2nd Year Director; Lavonne Foldenauer 2nd Year Director. Members' Comments: Bryant Hiiter commented 8. on the new blue signage our building has for the variety of activities that take place here. There is no signage for LGMS. Gayland Allen commented on Hartland Youth Football complaining about lack of parking for them during our show. Dealers are locked into the date of our show so we will have to look for another solution to the problem other than moving the show date. Bill Magee recommended that our library purchase various rockhounding books for visiting different states, Bryant stated we have \$250 available in the library fund so that purchase will be possible. A suggestion was made to purchase or have a 40 inch TV be donated to use at our show. We also must look into purchase of a better microphone and speaker system for the show. The Mid-West Federation has lots of videos we can borrow if we have the equipment to view them.
