- 2. Cari can answer emails until Terri returns.
- **3.** Cari will print lots of forms for new membership packets and bring them to the office.
- **4.** Cari is willing to keep track of drawer numbers and who has paid to rent them.
- **5.** Cari can call Hartland Township to reserve the Pavilion for summer meetings. 5:30-7:30pm (need a half hour to set up).

New Business

- 1. Training for 4H kids might start on Monday nights in March or April. Bryant has been talking with the group and they are definitely interested. WE WILL NEED TRAINERS.
- 2. Cari reserved the gym for the 2025 Dream Show and Holiday Party. The rates will go up from 2024. The prices will be submitted to LGMS in June. The gym will be reserved for Sept 19th-21st. The September meeting should be held early in the month, Sept 9th.
- **3.** May Show. Church needs to be reserved, and the preferred date is before Mother's Day. With a lot of club members selling it will be difficult to get volunteers for security and the club table. We need advertising, and lots of signs set up. The booth fee will most likely be \$25 per spot for members, and \$50 for other vendors. A sign-up sheet will be put in the shop in the spring.

Or perhaps have people who cause more wear and tear, pay more, so the club gets the funds to replace the blades.
 - a. 2 free rough rock slices per day, then charge \$1 per cut.
 - b. Get 14' saw up and running. People will need special training to use it.
- **6.** It was suggested that the sludge in the Big Saw is scooped out late on Friday and allowed to drain all weekend. But no one is available to do it regularly.
- 7. Joe Musolf mentioned he has a gravity saw we could possibly use in the shop. But the last gravity saw we had was too large and extremely noisy.
- **8.** Nancy Bartel would like to organize a field trip to the UP this year. Information might be available at the March meeting. It was mentioned that members who attend meetings get the first chance to sign up for field trips if there is a limit on the number that can attend.
- **9.** Joe Musolf talked about other potential field trip locations such as picking thru piles at Team Elmer's Quarry, Holcrim Quarry, and Partridge Point. The Jackson club is going to Rockport State Park, maybe we can join them?
- **10.** Rock of the Month will resume in March and take place immediately following the March general meeting.

Amethyst - February's birthstone

Amethyst is purple quartz. It is a beautiful blend of violet and red that can be found in every corner of the world. The name comes from the Ancient Greek, derived from the word methustos, which means "intoxicated." Ancient wearers believed the gemstone could protect them from drunkenness.

Amethyst, as previously mentioned, is composed of quartz, which is the second most abundant material found in Earth's crust. Amethyst gets its color from irradiation, iron impurities, and the presence of trace elements. Its hardness—a 7 on the Mohs scale—is the same as other quartz, which makes it a durable and lasting option for jewelry.

While amethyst is most commonly recognized to be a purple color, the gemstone can range from a light pinkish violet to a deep purple that can read more blue or red, depending on the light. Sometimes the same stone can have layers or color variants, so the way the gemstone is cut is important to the way the color shows in a finished piece.

Amethyst often occurs in geodes or in the cavities of granitic rocks. It can be found all over the world, including the United States, Canada, Brazil, and Zambia.
